FACULTY SEARCHES:

We have currently filled four positions, additional offers are out, and interviews continue.

ADMINISTRATIVE SEARCHES:

On April 2, 2012, Huey Shi Chew joined The University of Scranton's International Programs and Services Office as the new director of international student and scholar services. Ms. Chew comes to Scranton having previously served as international student coordinator at Missouri Western State University, and prior to that as associate director of international admissions at Pittsburg State University, where she won the Rising Star Award for professional staff. Ms. Chew received her B.SC. in mathematics from the University Science in Malaysia, her M.ED. in guidance and counseling from University Malaya Malaysia, and her Ed.S in higher education administration from Pittsburg State University.

FIRST YEAR SEMINAR

There are currently fewer than at anticipated fifty-five First Year Seminars needed for the fall of 2012. Students will be registered for seminars as long as there are openings. If needed, faculty who are interested, in departments able to do so, will be able to offer seminars in the spring, and students not registered for a seminar in the fall will meet the obligation in the spring.

Following the March Faculty Senate meeting, there was a Brown Bag meeting to discuss next steps in the discussion of credit reduction. In line with the Senate's resolution, those present agreed that the Provost would remind all involved that when the master schedule was done in the fall of 2012 for the year 2013-2014 departments chair's should take into account the proposed elimination of Comm 100, C/Il 102, and the three Phys Ed requirements, and that work should begin on reworking the grids that guide students in course selection for majors.

Work on the Student Wellness plan, as noted in Dave Hair's memo has been conflicted and is uneven in its accomplishments. The problems associated with adding the three credit First Year Seminar to credit heavy majors are manageable. Most majors do not schedule freshmen to take Phys Ed in the fall. This suggests that for scheduling purposes, even credit heavy majors are not facing immediate problems. The long term pressure on credit heavy majors can thus be handled through the ordinary Faculty Senate deliberations and the administrative routine already proposed for next year.

The deans and I will continue to work with Student Affairs and the Department of Exercise Science to develop a quality Student Wellness Program.
