## SPRING BREAK

**Washington, DC** - The McKenna Center serves the area by operating a daytime drop-in Center for homeless men, one of two such facilities in downtown Washington. We offer our guests assistance with showers, laundry, telephone and local transportation, as well as referrals for a wide array of basic services to meet medical, employment and other personal needs. We assist over 100 men a day with these programs. Our Transitional Shelter program will assist a dozen men each year in learning to regain life and work skills. In addition, we respond to hypothermia alerts each winter by offering overnight relief from the cold to up to 25 men, who are otherwise extremely vulnerable to winter weather. Our outreach to households in our community includes provision of rent and utility assistance to scores of households each year, as well as the emergency food program, which assists two hundred fifty families annually, by providing a food bag each month.

### **IMPORTANT:**

- For trips during the early part of Intercession (North Carolina and Garrison, NY), trips will return to Scranton. We will make residence hall accommodations for you for the night of your return **ONLY**; however, meals are not available with your meal plan. Please make arrangements to be picked up on the day following your return to campus by 12:00 noon.
- For trips at the end of January (Los Angeles and Savannah), you may be flying back into Scranton, or you may be flying into Philly or NY. If flights arrive back into Scranton, we will make accommodations for you to stay in your residence hall until the Spring semester begins on Wednesday, January 30 (halls officially open at noon on Tuesday, January 29). Meals will not be available with your meal plan until dinner on Tuesday, January 29. **Please be aware that you are responsible for the cost of your meals once you return to campus from your service trips. You may use flex or cash. The 3<sup>rd</sup> floor dining hall and 1<sup>st</sup> floor food court run on limited hours during Intercession. Keep this in mind when selecting a trip.**
- For Spring Break trips, most trips will return to Scranton on Wednesday evening, March 27. You will be able to stay in your residence hall that night **ONLY**. Please make arrangements in advance to have a ride pick you up by Thursday, March 28 by 12:00 noon and keep this in mind as you select trips.
- The Spring Break trip to New Orleans will not return to campus until Thursday night, March 28 (Holy Thursday). Students will be able to stay in their residence halls for this night **ONLY** and **MUST** be picked up by 10:00am on Friday, March 29. **Please remember this as you are signing up for a trip.**
